

**De La Salle Christian Brothers
New Orleans-Santa Fe District and San Francisco District**

New Forms of Collaboration • July 2007

CLOSE COOPERATION BETWEEN the Districts of New Orleans-Santa Fe and San Francisco is not new. In recent years, shared activities between the New Orleans-Santa Fe District and the San Francisco District have steadily expanded. Lasallians in both Districts at every level – individuals, school communities, administrators, and District leadership – have been finding opportunities for mutual support and deepened association.

These have included mutual participation in the Lasallian Leadership Institute, the sharing of Brother personnel, the collaborative work at San Miguel High School (Tucson), and the sharing of various consulting services and training programs. Students and faculty from schools of both Districts have participated in summer programs such as Lasallian Student Leaders and the Lasallian Youth Assembly. Recently, faculty from St. Paul's School in Covington, Louisiana, and from J.K. Mullen High School in Denver joined San Francisco District faculty in a Religious Studies workshop at St. Joseph's Camp on the Russian River in California.

Both Districts, in consultation with the U.S./Toronto Region and the Generalate of the Institute in Rome, have continued to explore ways of increasing their collaboration. Recently the two Districts have agreed on some steps toward this end. One step will be the gradual phasing in of participation by the New Orleans-Santa Fe District in the array of programs that the San Francisco District has developed, such as the Catholic Lasallian Assessment Process (CLASP), teacher formation activities, formation programs for boards of trustees and administrators, student programs, and networking activities such as the Secondary Schools Administrators

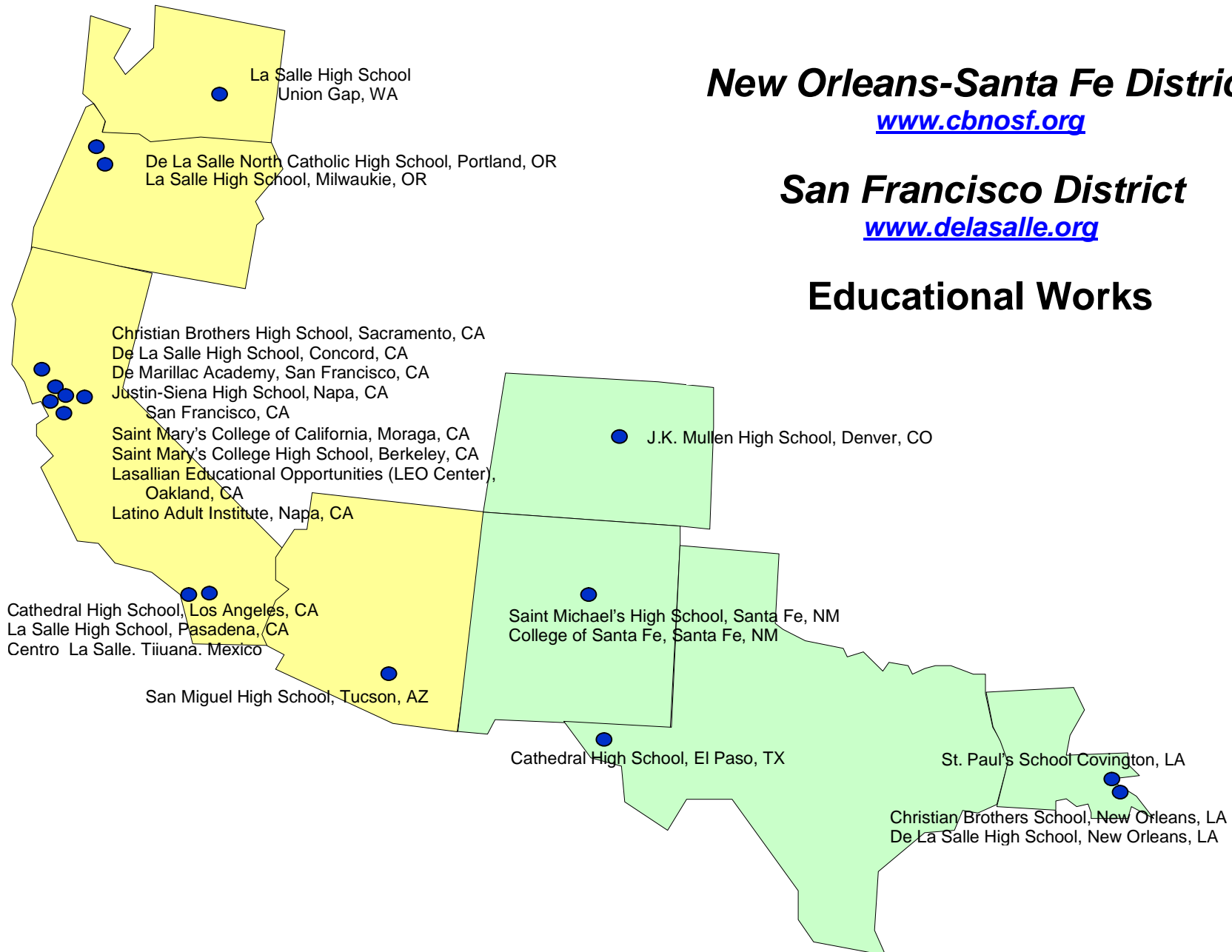
Association (SSAA). Administrators from New Orleans-Santa Fe schools have expressed enthusiastic interest in this opportunity.

Another step taken recently is the inclusion within the Lasallian Education Corporation (LEC) of Members and Trustees from the New Orleans-Santa Fe District. The LEC is a governing structure established by the San Francisco District in support of the middle and secondary schools of the De La Salle Christian Brothers. The LEC bylaws have been revised to allow for these changes while continuing the oversight of the schools in each District through District representatives, both Brothers and Lasallian Partners, named by their respective Brother Visitors. The first meeting of the LEC in its expanded form was held on July 5, 2007.

These steps are taken in view of the needs and interests of the schools in the New Orleans-Santa Fe District and the San Francisco District as part of an ongoing effort to ensure quality programs in the schools. Increasing cooperation between our Districts will be a win-win situation, with participants from both Districts making their distinctive contributions and all gaining a deepened association for the educational mission.
